

## Join us as we start a review of Quality throughout History, starting in the 13th Century with Medieval guilds.

The quality movement can trace its roots back to medieval Europe, where craftsmen began organizing into unions called guilds in the late 13th century. These guilds were responsible for developing strict rules for product and service quality. Inspection committees enforced the rules by marking flawless goods with a special mark or symbol.

Craftsmen themselves often placed a second mark on the goods they produced. At first this mark was used to track the origin of faulty items. But over time the mark came to represent a craftsman's good reputation. Inspection marks and master craftsmen marks served as proof of quality for customers throughout medieval Europe. This approach to manufacturing quality was dominant until the Industrial Revolution in the early 19th century.

In the next newsletter we'll explore quality during the industrial revolution!

### **Upcoming Education Opportunities!**

The Rhode Island Section of the American Society for Quality will be hosting a **Certified Quality Engineer** refresher course beginning on January 17, 2023. This course provides a thorough overview of the core competencies needed for the contemporary quality engineer including:

- Quantitative tools and techniques that drive continuous improvement
- Statistical data analysis and interpretation
- Design of products, processes, and services
- Product and process control techniques
- Quality management and leadership principles and techniques
- Development of the quality management system (QMS)

The instructor will be Caroline Bartlett, Certified Quality Engineer working as a Manager of Quality Engineering in the Medical Device Industry. She has 10 years experience working in Quality Engineering in various roles, including post market surveillance, design assurance, and quality control for large scale manufacturing.

This course will be offered on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 5:00 pm to 6:30 pm for 14 weeks for a total of 42 hours of training in preparation for the exam.

The cost for the course is \$800.00 per registrant, and this includes a Quality Council of Indiana CQE Primer (an \$85.00 value).
